

he faculty and staff at the University of Scranton understand that education has to be personal in order for it to be effective. With an undergraduate enrollment of 3,500 students, a student-to-faculty ratio of 14:1 and an average class size of 20, we are a university that can deliver personal attention to all our students. In fact, we are known for it. As a campus visit will quickly reveal, we are a friendly place where students know each other and their professors.

SERVICE MAKES A DIFFERENCE

At the University of Scranton we take your academic success very seriously. One of the best ways we demonstrate this commitment is through our extensive academic advising and support programs.

Both faculty and counselors participate in advising through Advising Offices located in all three undergraduate colleges. The Office of Career Services helps with career development, job searching and planning academic work after graduation.

The Learning Resources Center provides individual, group and computer-assisted instruction to help with oral and written communication, study skills, critical thinking and specific courses. We offer a Reading Clinic staffed by a reading specialist to help correct weaknesses and improve skills.

The professional staff of our Counseling Center is available to help all students with personal and interpersonal issues through

individual and group counseling.

For over 25 years, our Academic Development Program has successfully helped students who have achieved in high school but whose SAT/ACT scores and high school courses indicate a need to strengthen verbal skills. To meet this challenge, the University helps these students in their freshman year to make the transition from high school to college by developing reading and writing skills.

A campus **Multicultural Center** provides all our students with a place to gather for conversation and discussion and with information about the richness found in other cultures.

SUCCESSFUL GRADUATES

he success of our graduates in their careers and in life is one of the best measures of our work. With many opportunities to enrich the classroom experience through collaborative research with faculty, internships or volunteer work, our students leave here prepared to achieve in a global society. Of the students who start here has freshmen, over 80% remain to graduate. The national average is 47%. Within six months of graduation, 96% of the Class of 1996 were either employed or attending professional or graduate school on a full-time basis. In just the last ten years, this number has averaged 95% in spite of everchanging economic and employment conditions.

FINANCIAL AID

We are very aware that college is a serious investment for our students and their families. Financial planning will no doubt play an important role as you prepare for the first year in college.

The University provides considerable financial aid from its own resources to help. Eighty-eight percent of the freshman financial aid applicants enrolled in the University in 1997/98 were offered a financial aid package that included University funds. In addition to full- and partial-tuition merit-based University scholarships,


federal aid, state aid, loans and campus work study, the University has established the Claver Award to assist underrepresented minority students who demonstrate financial need.

All students are evaluated for merit aid upon acceptance. No special applications are needed. Students who want to be reviewed for need-based aid must complete the Free Application for Financial Aid (FAFSA) and either the University of Scranton Application for Financial Aid or the College Scholarship Service Profile Applications. You should also check with your high school guidance counselor to determine if you need to file any additional state grant applications. The preferred filing date for these forms is February 15.

Campus Activities

On weekends, you'll find about three-quarters of our resident students remain on campus. There are over 80 clubs and organizations in which to get involved. As an NCAA Division III institution, we also offer 18 varsity sports and extensive intramural and recreation programs. The following are some of the activities and organizations that are dedicated to enriching our multicultural campus.

In order to emphasize the importance of multiculturalism, the **United Colors Society** sponsors activities to celebrate African American, Hispanic and other cultures and to support persons of all races and backgrounds throughout the University.

With students from 38 countries across the world on campus, the International Student Association encourages an awareness of and responsibility toward a united group of world citizens and educates the University about diverse international cultures.

Our Gospel choir, United Voices of Joy, is committed to expressing the joy of Christ through song within the University of Scranton and beyond though such activities as an annual Gospelfest, local performances and community service.

Theme Houses provide sophomores, juniors and seniors with the opportunity to live with students who share common interests in a number of areas. Houses include United Colors House, International House, Spanish House, French House, Liva Arts House, Business Leadership House, and others.

The staff of Campus Ministry and hundreds of student volunteers coordinate daily, weekly and special liturgical celebrations. We serve students of other faiths in cooperation with local clergy and through coordination of a campus mosque. In addition, nearby congregations of many faiths invite our students to worship and participate in activities.
