## GENERAL UNIVERSITY HISTORY

University of Scranton was founded as Saint Thomas College in 1888. Its University Charter was received in 1938 and in 1942 it became the twenty-fourth of the twenty-eight Jesuit Colleges and Universities.

The University is an urban liberal arts college conducted by the Jesuit Fathers. It is situated close to the business district in the city of Scranton, Pennsylvania. The city, the focal point of the federal highway system in northeastern United States, is less than three hours driving distance from New York and Philadelphia. Within easy travel distance are the beautiful Pocono Mountains and the Susquehanna River resorts with hundreds of streams, lakes and magnificent scenery.

The University is in the midst of a multi-million dollar development project which, when completed, will give Scranton one of the most modern campuses in the East. Already completed and in use are the new Loyola Hall of Science, the magnificent Student Center, the University Library, ten new student dormitories, and a \$1.5 million classroom and administration building, Saint Thomas Hall.

New outdoor recreation facilities were completed in the fall of 1966. Three basketball, three volleyball courts and a large turf area for field sports are provided in the new recreation area.

Construction is now in progress on the University's massive Physical Education Building. When completed in January 1968, the new building will enable the University to institute an academic program in physical education and give greater emphasis to intramural athletics.

University of Scranton is accredited by the Pennsylvania Department of Public Instruction, the Middle States Association of Colleges, Board of Regents of New York and is a member of the Association of American Colleges and the American Council on Education.

## PHYSICAL EDUCATION BUILDING

Construction began July 20, 1966 on University of Scranton's \$1.8 million Physical Education Building, depicted on the back cover of this brochure.

The multi-purpose, three-level structure will be situated on the corner of Linden St. and Catlin Court, on a tract of land acquired from the Scranton Redevelopment Authority.

Funds for the structure were supplied by a recently approved \$592,110 Higher Education Facilities Act grant and a \$1,206,660 university contribution. Part of the university funds were gained through an \$815,000 federal loan.

The three-levels of the building will follow the contour of land bordering Catlin Court, providing a single level on Linden St. and a three-story end of the building, overlooking Ridge Row.

The main floor area of the building, 163 feet long by 140 feet wide, will provide nine instruction areas, suitable for concurrent use in each period of class instruction. Three main instructional areas provide for large group activities, which can be used for student basketball activities and six special instructional areas will allow individual and small group instructional activities. A nylon separation wall, in the large class area, permits simultaneous teaching by two instructors without the danger of class distraction.

When completed, the new multi-purpose facility will enable the university to institute an academic program in physical education and give greater emphasis to intramural athletics. The main floor area will provide space for student assemblies, convocations, commencements and other large gatherings. The large foyer, on the Linden St., side of the building, will provide space for mass student registrations, assembly of classes and group meetings.



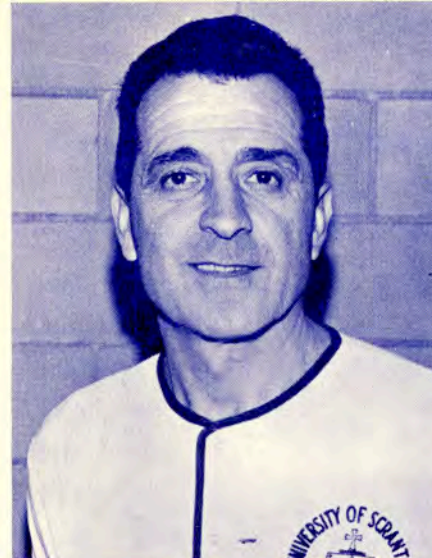
Six faculty offices, six conferences rooms and two instructional classrooms for wrestling and weight lifting are included in the plans for the physical education building.

More than 2,000 lockers are to be included in the building for use by the University of Scranton student body.

Commenting on the new physical education building, Father Aloysius C. Galvin, S.J., U of S president, stated that: "We are now eager to move on the Physical Education front: to erect a building, to initiate an academic program in physical education and to satisfy an acute space shortage.

"A structure such as we propose is functional in design, economically modest, versatile in utilization, and academically imperative for a modern college's higher educational mission and program. In our urban situation, devoid of green campus luxury and alternative facilities for physical education, this edifice will be used continually daily and well into the evening," he said.

A target date, January 8, 1968, has been set for completion of the massive Physical Education structure.



## Head Basketball Coach NAT VOLPE

In his second year as coach, Nat is a native of New York City. Volpe has been head basketball coach and director of athletics at Archbishop Stepinac High School in White Plains, New York since 1948.

Nat Volpe's eminence in the world of basketball began in 1938 when, as Captain of Manhattan College's Basketball Team, he was named to the All-American and All-Metropolitan Teams and selected as the outstanding player in New York City.

After graduation from Manhattan, Volpe immediately launched his coaching career with a two-year stint as freshman coach at Manhattan College, then to Cardinal Hayes High School in New York as Varsity Basketball Coach while working for graduate honors at Columbia University.

He remained at Cardinal Hayes until 1948, highlighting this span with the 1944 New York City Catholic High School Championship. In 1948, he was named Athletic Director and Basketball Coach at Archbishop Stepinac High School in White Plains, N.Y., where he undertook the task of building athletics at the brand new Westchester County School.

During his career at Stepinac, Volpe has won numerous honors for the school, including the Westchester Private and Parochial Schools Championship four years in succession (1951-54); The 1960 Westchester, Catholic High School Metropolitan Titles and the Consolation Champion in the National Catholic Tournament at Washington, D.C., and the 1963 Catholic High School Division Championship.

In 1960 Volpe was selected as Coach of the Year by the Westchester Rockland Newspapers, Inc., in competition with more than 50 scholastic coaches in the area.

One of the Metropolitan Area's foremost basketball officials, Volpe has officiated at Madison Square Garden, in Buffalo, Philadelphia and other major arenas and been an official in Ivy League, and other Major Collegiate Conferences. He has also worked as an official in the National Invitation Tournament at the Garden. He is married and the father of two children.
