Jumaane Smith

Composer/conductor/trumpeter Jumaane Smith has established himself as a strong leader and inspired colleague of some of the most highly acclaimed jazz musicians in the United States and abroad. He has performed with such artists as Rashied Ali, Wynton Marsalis, Wycliffe Gordon, Jon Faddis, Eddie Locke, Bobby Short, Herb Jeffries, Frank Lowe, Burt Wilson, Steve Kirby, Eric Reed, Peter Bernstein, James Hurt, Jeff Watts, Ron Westray, Loren Schoenburg, Clark Terry and Percy Heath.

Smith has performed at a variety of legendary jazz venues in New York, among them Birdland, Café Carlyle, The Knitting Factory, Alice Tully Hall, Avery Fisher Hall, Jazz at Lincoln Center, and The Village Vanguard, as well as at many other venues throughout the United States.

Smith's performances abroad have included The Montreux Jazz Festival in Switzerland, The North Sea Jazz Festival in Prague, The Montreal Jazz Festival, and festivals in Italy, Germany, France, Canada and Mexico. In 2002 he was selected to attend and perform at the International Academy of Achievement Summit in Dublin, Ireland as a "Marsalis Scholar" and was recognized as one of the first musicians ever selected to attend the event.

Smith is a highly versatile musician, and his performance, composition, and arranging credits range from jazz to classical and include various world music styles. Many of his performance credits have included music composed by and/or arranged by Mr. Smith. His compositions are also regularly featured in performances by large and small ensembles at The Juilliard School.

His lead playing ability stands out among young lead trumpeters of today, an ability which has been well recognized by artists like Bobby Short, Lew Soloff, Loren Schoenburg, Victor Goines, and among his colleagues in the Jazz Studies program at The Juilliard School, where he currently serves as the lead trumpeter for The Juilliard Jazz Orchestra.

Currently Smith is completing his degree program at The Juilliard School Jazz Studies Department under the tutelage of Wynton Marsalis, Lew Soloff, Joe Wilder, Warren Vache and Mark Gould.

The University of Scranton World Premiere Composition Series is a remarkable event. Commissioning on an ongoing basis anywhere in the country is rare at best. To see this type of project at the university level, and at a school without a conservatory orientation, is truly incredible. The series gives student musicians the extremely unusual opportunity of working with a living composer and gives the audience the unique chance to witness firsthand the evolution of a piece of music and the interpretation by the composer of the very first performance of his work. The opportunity for dialogue between composer, performer and audience is truly great. By sponsoring this performance series, the support to the arts offered by PennStar is both real and symbolic, and evidences their firm commitment to supporting the development of today's culture and the music of our time. I am honored to have been one of the first composers to have participated.
